## General APA Guidelines

Your essay should be typed and double-spaced on standard-sized paper (8.5" x 11"), with 1" margins on all sides. You should use a clear font that is highly readable. APA recommends using 12 pt. Times New Roman font.

# Referencing - In-text citations

1. If not stated otherwise in the journal's style sheet, use double quotes ("Text Text Text").
2. Introduce the quote with a single phrase that includes the author's surname:


According to Author (2019), "Text Text Text..." (p. 150).

3. If the author is not named:

He stated, "Text Text Text..." (Author, 2019, p. 150).

4. Quotations longer than 40 words need to be indented.

**Abstract:**

Multimodal transcription, particularly as devised by Thibaut (2000), provides an effective methodological tool in the analysis of audiovisual text. The method involves breaking down a film into single frames/shots/phases, and analyzing all the semiotic modalities operating in each frame/shot/phase. The purpose of the present article is to show how this methodology can be adopted (and adapted) to formulate strategies for subtitling, particularly in relation to the translation of Italian film material into English, but also into German, French and Spanish.
