For me, the Linguistic Marathon was a remarkable experience, as it was my first time in the countries we visited. That we travelled across four European countries and presented papers at five universities in them offered me the opportunity to explore other European cultures and academic traditions. From Brno in the Czech Republic and Klagenfurt in Austria to four cities in Italy, I had opportunities to present my research to both students and experienced academics. The students asked valuable questions, and the researchers made comments that opened my eyes to new insights in research. The other attractions of the trip were the beautiful Alps and the distinctive cultures in the countries (architecture, monuments, and food).
